

Guidance for completing the Evaluation Form

A "BIG THANK YOU" in advance for filling in this evaluation form, or passing it on to the relevant person. We know that filling in forms is a chore, but we really need the information to progress. Last year we used the data from the evaluation forms

- to help plan resources and strategy for this year;
- to inform our funders of statistics (e.g. numbers of OWW events taking place, the faith groups planning and attending OWW events and the themes that were covered during OWW events).
- to promote OWW on the website and elsewhere
- to write annual reports for the Ubuntu project, our other funders and the Charity Commission

The format for this evaluation form is very similar so that we can compare results each year; hopefully showing that more people are taking up OWW. This not only ensures that funding can continue but crucially demonstrates that OWW events are important in raising awareness of development issues.

Guidance Notes

- 1. When completing the form please use capital letters and clear handwriting.
- **2.** Where numbers are asked for please use **whole numbers and not percentages**. This enables us to collate all the data more quickly.
- **3.** If you require more space, please label your answers clearly on additional paper.
- **4. Please refer to this list when completing Question F1.** If your event does not fit into these given please specify the type of event you held.

Guidance for collecting the data

Attached is a OWW Event Data Gathering Sheet and a OWW Event Survey. Either/both of these forms can be used during or after your events and we hope that they help you to complete the OWW 2009 Evaluation Form afterwards.

These forms can be used as they are or adapted to suit your needs. They have been made so that you can photocopy and circulate. Sample documents can be downloaded and modified from the website.

Depending on the event you could:

- Leave on seats for attendees to fill in
- Hand out at a stand for people to fill in
- Enlarge either sheet then hand out post-it notes/ pens for people to fill in
- Go round asking people individually and filling in their answers on the **OWW Survey**.

If you have other ideas for collecting the data please do let us know.

Some suggestions for asking people to respond to your event

- a. Ask people attending to write a pledge down. E.g. As a result of this event I pledge to...
- b. Have a plenary session asking people to write on flip chart/post-it notes/white board/tell someone some/all of the following: what they enjoyed, what they learned and one thing that they will take away from this event.
- c. Ask the people attending if they would come back again next year. This could be verbal or written, by a show of hands.
- d. Interview individuals, have some questions ready, such as "What does the world hunger for? How can you be a solution to the hunger in the world? Can you tell me what you think about ... (issue you are raising)?" Use these clips to capture different opinions. You could film people and send in the video.
